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Post-Submission Application Materials

- **Allowable Post-Submission Materials include:**
 - Revised budget pages due to new funding or institutional acquisition of equipment
 - Biosketches for change of senior/key personnel
 - Letters of support or collaboration resulting from a change in senior/key personnel due to the hiring, replacement, or loss of an investigator
 - Adjustments resulting from natural disasters
 - Adjustments resulting from change of institution
 - News of an article accepted for publication
 - **News of a professional promotion or positive tenure decision for PI or senior/key personnel**
 - **RFA-specific exceptions for last due date of the RFA**
 - **Some changes for training and training-related grants**

Should a Consultant Be “Key”

Should a Consultant be Designated as Senior/Key Personnel in My Grant Application?

Generally, a consultant is not considered senior/key personnel. However, if the consultant contributes to the scientific development or execution of a project substantively and measurably, he/she should be designated as senior/key personnel and would be included in the Senior/Key Person Profile Component. RPPR for SNAP and Fellowship Prog Rpts

- Research Performance Progress Report (RPPR) will be **required** for:
 - SNAP Reports
 - Fellowship Reports
- For all non-competing continuations with start dates on or after July 1, 2013
 - SNAP Reports with due dates of May 15th
 - Fellowship Reports with due dates of May 1st
- RPPR is optional for reports due in March or April

Changes to Public Access Policy Compliance

- Applies to all awards with anticipated start dates on or after July 1, 2013
- NIH will delay processing of an award if publications arising from it are not in compliance with the NIH Public Access Policy
- Investigators will need to use My NCBI to enter papers onto progress report
 - Associated electronically using the RPPR
 - Included in PHS 2590 using My NCBI generated PDF report

Publications Report

- **My Bibliography can now generate a PDF report of publications that may be printed and submitted as Section 2.2.6, Section E. Publications, of the paper PHS 2590 progress report.**

Upcoming changes to K99

- **NIH Intends to make significant changes including:**
 - **No more than 4 years as postdoc at time of application**
 - **Must proposal a plan for a substantive period of mentored training (not to exceed 2 years)**
 - **No less than 12 months of mentored training and career development before transitioning to the R00**
 - **Individuals close to achieving an independent position are not strong candidates for the K99**
 - **If applicant achieves independence prior to initiating the K99 phase, neither the K99 nor the R00 will be awarded**
